

Your story has power because it carries testimony—proof of God's goodness, faithfulness, and redemption. The Bible reminds us that we overcome by the word of our testimony (Revelation 12:11). That means your words don't just tell a story—they tear down strongholds.

But I understand that starting can feel overwhelming. What part of your story do you share? How do you write it in a way that helps others while protecting your own healing journey?

That's why I created this guide—to help you identify the heart of your message, find your voice, and begin writing with confidence and clarity.

TIP #1: IDENTIFY WHO NEEDS YOUR MESSAGE

Before you write a single word, pause and pray: "Lord, who is my story meant to reach?" It's one of the most important questions you can ask, because writing without an audience in mind can make even the most powerful testimony feel unfocused or ineffective. As believers, we're called to speak words that are "edifying, administered with grace, and full of wisdom" (Colossians 4:6; Ephesians 4:29). But that wisdom looks different depending on who we're speaking to.

Even Jesus adjusted His message to fit His audience—He spoke differently to the Pharisees than He did to the disciples or to the crowds. The truth never changed, but His tone and examples did. He met people where they were. Your writing should do the same. Another common mistake is thinking your story is for everyone. When we write to everyone, we often end up writing to no one—our message becomes too broad to pierce the hearts it's meant to reach. God doesn't call us to reach everyone; He calls us to reach the ones He's assigned to us.

For example: If your testimony involves overcoming spiritual or emotional abuse by someone within the church, your audience might not be "women of faith" in general. It could be young women aged 15–21 who have experienced trauma from someone they trusted spiritually—those who feel unheard, unsafe, or uncertain about their faith.

That kind of focus doesn't narrow your impact—it multiplies it. It ensures your story lands exactly where God intends it to: in the hands of those who need it most.

As you define your audience, write down:

- Who they are (age, gender, faith background)
- What they're struggling with
- What questions they're asking God
- How you can help them find hope, healing, or clarity through your story

Once you know who you're writing for, you'll find your tone, structure, and message start falling into place naturally.

TIP #2: DECIDE WHAT KIND OF TESTIMONY YOU'RE WRITING



Every story has a heartbeat—but not every testimony needs to look the same. Before you begin, ask yourself: What form best fits my message, and the readers God is calling me to reach?

Your testimony can be told through memoir, fiction, devotional, or teaching-style writing. Each offers a different way to glorify God and reach specific audiences.

1. Memoir: A Transparent Journey

If your goal is to show readers exactly how God brought you through something, memoir may be the best fit. Memoirs invite readers to walk beside you—to feel your struggles, your lessons, and your breakthroughs. They work best when they blend raw honesty with clear spiritual insight.

Examples:

- *I Will Always Write Back* by Caitlin Alifirenka and Martin Ganda a story of connection and generosity that illustrates global compassion and faith in action.
- *Uninvited* by Lysa TerKeurst a transparent account of rejection and God's healing, written with conversational warmth.
- *The Wait* by Devon Franklin and Meagan Good blending personal story and spiritual principles to show faith in relationships.

"God can use memoir, fiction, or devotion—but only you can tell the story He gave you."

2. Fiction: A Story That Mirrors Truth

Fiction can also carry testimony—just in disguise. Sometimes readers who would never pick up a devotional will eagerly read a novel that shows God's power through character and plot.

Examples:

- Redeeming Love by Francine Rivers a retelling of Hosea's story through historical romance.
- *The Shack* by William P. Young exploring forgiveness and the nature of God through allegory.
- *The Masterpiece* by Francine Rivers weaving trauma, redemption, and grace into contemporary fiction.

When you choose fiction, think about which biblical truth or lived experience you want to reflect. You're still testifying—you're just using story as the vessel.

3. Devotional or Teaching Book: A Guided Reflection

If your message includes practical lessons or Scriptures readers can apply to their own journey, a devotional or teaching-style book may fit best. These often weave short testimonies with actionable steps, prayer prompts, or journaling space.

Examples:

- Don't Settle for Safe by Sarah Jakes Roberts part storytelling, part life coaching.
- 100 Days of Believing Bigger by Marshawn Evans Daniels daily reflections rooted in identity and purpose.
- *Battlefield of the Mind* by Joyce Meyer instructional teaching laced with personal examples.

? Ask Yourself:

- What is the main message I want readers to walk away with?
- Do I want to inspire, equip, or teach?
- Which format will allow me to stay authentic to my calling and comfortable in my storytelling voice?

Remember—God can use any genre to reveal His glory. What matters is that you write truthfully, intentionally, and with love.

TIP #3 – DETERMINE YOUR TONE AND VOICE



Your tone is the sound of your calling—it's how readers experience you on the page.

If your goal is to eventually teach, speak, or lead through conferences, it's essential that your written voice and your spoken voice match. When people meet you in person, they should instantly recognize the same heart, rhythm, and energy they felt while reading your book.

Consistency builds connection.

If your book sounds poetic but you speak with powerful directness, readers may feel a disconnect when they encounter you later. On the other hand, if your written and spoken voices align, readers will feel like they already know you—which builds trust and opens doors for ministry, mentoring, and influence.

The key? Be authentically you.

Don't try to sound like your favorite author, pastor, or influencer. Write the way you speak when your passion is stirred—when you're comforting a friend, encouraging a sister, or testifying about God's goodness.

"When readers hear you speak, they should recognize the voice that wrote to their hearts."

How Tone Shapes Connection

Here's how the same message—

- "Get up. Choose life. You don't have to die here."
- —can sound depending on your natural voice and purpose:

The Pastor's Voice (Encouraging & Authoritative):

"Get up, beloved. The same power that raised Jesus from the dead lives in you. You don't have to die here."

The Big Sister or Mentor Voice (Conversational & Relatable):

"Sis, get up. I know you're tired, but this isn't where your story ends. Choose life—there's still purpose in you."

The Coach or Speaker Voice (Motivational & Direct):

"Get up! Choose life today. This is not your final chapter—move forward with faith and fire."

The Devotional Writer's Voice (Reflective & Gentle):

"In every valley, God whispers, 'Get up. Choose life.' Even here, He's reminding you—you don't have to die in this place."

Each version carries the same truth, but the tone changes who it reaches and how it lands.

Write in the Voice You'll Speak In

As you write, imagine sitting across from your reader. What tone do they need to hear from you?

If they need comfort, write with gentleness.

If they need courage, write with boldness.

If they need direction, write with clarity and structure.

Above all, remember: your written voice is your ministry's introduction. Let it sound like the real you—honest, consistent, and led by the Spirit.

TIP #4: START WITH A SIMPLE OUTLINE

Outlining isn't about restricting creativity — it's about giving revelation a roadmap. When you know where your story is headed, you can move forward in confidence, leaving room for the Holy Spirit to guide your words along the way.

Think of your outline as a ministry plan for your message. Each chapter becomes a moment of transformation — for you and your reader. The goal is to lead readers through your testimony in a way that draws them in, helps them see themselves in your story, and builds faith that the same God who kept you is willing and able to keep them.

Your story should be practical (so they can apply it), applicable (so they can see themselves in it), and powerful (so their faith grows as they turn each page).

Below is a simple 10-chapter structure to help you map it out.

Introduction: Who You Are and Why You're Writing

Start by introducing yourself — not your résumé, but your reason.

What moved you to write this story? What transformation do you want your reader to experience by the end?

Set expectations here: "This isn't just my story; it's an invitation for you to believe again."

Chapter 1: Set the Scene

Begin with impact. Start at a high point — a dramatic or emotionally gripping moment that captures the reader's attention.

Don't be afraid of a little "holy drama." It doesn't have to be sensational, but it should make readers lean in.

Maybe this is the night you hit rock bottom, the moment you heard God's voice for the first time, or the situation that changed everything.

You can always move backward or forward in time later — right now, your mission is to grab their heart.

Chapters 2–8: Build the Journey

This is where your story breathes. Take readers deeper into your experience — not just what happened, but what you felt, learned, and lost.

Each chapter should pull them a little closer to both your struggle and God's sustaining grace.

For example:

If Chapter 1 introduces the first time you used drugs, the next chapters might explore how addiction took hold, what it cost you, and the moments when God's hand quietly kept you from destruction.

Sprinkle wisdom throughout — revelations you didn't recognize then but can articulate now. Remember, your goal isn't to glorify pain — it's to glorify the One who delivered you from it.

Chapter 9: The Climax

Here comes the breakthrough. This is the moment where everything that could go wrong did — and God showed up.

Maybe it's the day you overdosed, the night you almost lost everything, or the moment someone you loved called you out of darkness.

Whatever it was, this chapter should pulse with desperation, surrender, and divine intervention. It's the turning point — the "but God" moment that transforms your story from tragedy to testimony.

Chapter 10: The New Normal

Every testimony needs a resurrection. This final chapter shows what life looks like after redemption — how you've changed, what peace feels like now, and how you're walking with God in freedom.

Close strong:

- What lessons do you want your readers to take away?
- What practical steps can they apply to their own healing?
- What encouragement do you want to leave echoing in their hearts?

This is your power-packed finale — your benediction to the reader.
